MATH 105 : Liberal Arts Mathematics: Moneymathics, where Money and Mathematics Meet Syllabus (Tentative)

Description: Study of the beauty and structure of mathematics, with emphasis on quantitative and analytical reasoning skills. Various areas of mathematics or its applications will be used as a vehicle for this study. Designed for students whose major area of study does not have specilic requirements in mathematics. 4 Hours Credit: Meets 4 hours per week. Meets General Education IVB or IVC.

Prerequisites: Three years of high school mathematics including geometry or college-level intermediate algebra.

Intended Audience: Liberal Arts Majors, particularly those interested how mathematics of investing, loans, and pensions work.

Objective: To introduce students to basic notions of interest theory, savings and loans. Students will learn how to calculate loan payments based on factors such as interest rate, length of the loan, and payment frequency.
